13.30 – 15.00	Session 1: Adapting labour markets to demographic shifts and increased longevity
	Demographic changes are reshaping labour markets as ageing reduces the share of working-age people and increases that of older people, who typically have lower employment rates. Governments must act now, focusing on measures that promotion healthy ageing and encourage labour market participation across all groups. Removing barriers to the employment of older workers, including by redesigning labour market institutions, and providing effective lifelong learning that keep skills updated are essenticated in this regard. Such comprehensive policy action can help tackle the challenger and seize the opportunities of a longevity society.

# Session 2: Workforce ageing and its effects on productivity and labour market dynamics

Population and workforces are ageing in the OECD area, coinciding with a slowdown in productivity growth. Better understanding the linkages is vital, especially at the industry level, given that workers' age composition and skill requirements vary across industries. OECD research shows that workforce ageing reduces productivity in skills-intensive and ICT-intensive industries, potentially weakening a country's innovation capacity. On the other hand, workforce ageing can have a positive effect on industry productivity through synergies between experienced and less experienced workers. Policies to help older workers update continuously their skills and increase job mobility, as well as age-diverse working environments can reduce skills mismatches and boost productivity.

10.15 – 11.45	Session 3: Addressing labour market shortages in an ageing society
	Population ageing reduces the share of workers in the population. Fully tapping into the skills and talents of all segments of society—including older individuals, women, you and immigrants is essential to help address emerging labour shortages. Making the education and training systems more responsive to evolving labour market needs show also be a high priority. Immigration can be an additional policy tool, though alone cannufully offset the impact of demographic change. To be effective, migration framework must be based on regular labour assessments, streamlined administrative processes and comprehensive integration programmes for immigrants.

	This session highlights evidence-based policy actions, drawing on country experience to address the impact of rapid demographic shifts on labour markets. While longer lie expectancy is a major achievement, it also poses significant challenges as it coincide with a slowing or shrinking working-age due to low fertility rates with broad socio-economic consequences. How people age is crucial-remaining healthy are productive is key. A timely, holistic approach is needed, combining fiscal and structur reforms, and redesigning health, pension, labour and educational institutions for ne realities.
